Mississippi Delta Film Academy Gets Spotlight on NPR



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Mississippi Delta Film Academy Student Featured by National Park Foundation

Myiesha Wright, a student who has been involved with the Mississippi Delta Film Academy for several years, was centrally featured in a story on the National Park Foundation website. Wright (pictured below) previously attended the Film Academy and returned this year as a student intern, serving as a mentor to the new participants.

The article reports on the power of stories that affected her. Emmett Till's, Mamie Till-Mobley's, and Fannie Lou Hamer's. These stories, coupled with the confidence she gained thanks to her new filmmaking skills, found their ultimate expression in Wright's film, "The Winona Project," which focuses on Hamer's life.



The article goes on to describe the efforts of the Emmett Till Interpretive Center to educate the public about the Till story and, with the support of organizations like the National Park Foundation, to foster a new generation of storytellers. Jessie Jaynes-Diming, ETIC's Special Projects Coordinator, said, "We hope that we can empower the young people who participate in the film academy to understand the power of narrative and how young people can make a difference."
